
Art Success

History Success

Mr Beech said 'As part of our 'Fight for the Franchise' history module we researched a local case study, that was national news in 1917 and has been in the news as recently as 2012. We learned about a Derby woman called Alice Wheeldon, who lived behind her second-hand clothes shop on Pear Tree Road. During the First World War Alice would hide Conscientious Objectors in her house. She became known for this, and other Suffragette activities, and was under the investigation of MI5. To ensure she would be no more trouble, an MI5 agent called William Rickard had Alice arrested after framing her for conspiracy to commit murder, her supposed target was the then Prime Minister, David Lloyd George.

Alice was subsequently charged on fabricated and extremely flimsy evidence and sentenced to 10 years in jail. She was released a year later under the orders of Lloyd George himself after she took part in a hunger strike.

To this day, Alice has never been cleared of the crimes she supposedly committed and her granddaughters, who live in Australia still petition to have Alice's name cleared. Additionally, there is a history in group that also campaign for this. They are the Derby peoples history society.

I suggested as an additional task that if any of my year 8 students wanted to support Alice then they could write a letter to the Derby peoples history society to maybe help get Alice cleared of her supposed crimes.

Please find attached Muskaan R's letter that she wrote for this cause, I think it really is amazing, well researched and something Muskaan should be really proud of.'

Dear Derby People's History,
Hello! I'm Muskaan from the City of Durby Academy.
The reason why I am writing to you is that I would like to show my support in the inscence of Alice Wheeldon.
Since we have been recently studying about this at school, I decided to take this matter further and resourch!
I believe Alice Mneeldon was framed by William Richard.
Alice Wheeldon, born on the 27th of January 1866, she gran up in a political household. She joined the Homen's Social and Political Union for nomen's rights. Alice also was part of the anti-nar compaign. Her and har family give shelter to conscientious abjectors [men who did not want to go to nor.]
Disviously, men who were conscientious stijectors were shown in the press as regulive and consorts.
My evidence to prove that she was framed is that a MIS agent, named William Rickhard arrived at Alice's doorstep disquised as a conscientious objector, knowingly told her to free more people like himself out of jail. Now, in those days, the prison had quard dags and in order to kill brom filice suggested that they use poison. She bought some from the drownist.
Keep in mind at and fact that William was a alchoholic and was about to lose his job.
Honever, the next day, flice's household and herself included got anested for conspling of murder of the Rime Minister David Lloyd George. The government was informed by William how one nanted to poison Lloyd George.
Although, on trial day, William was nowhere to be found. The evidence against Mrs Wheeldon wasn't efficiacious however the Government didn't want a woman who sheltered conscientous objectors on the losse. So instead, they sentenced her to 10 years of imprisonment.
Now, Alice also had a brok up her sleeve, something called the contract and masse? act. She went on hunger strikes which then got her released by Llayd George. If she were to resistent she mould be sent back in prison.
However, she died aged 53, on the 21th February 1919 caused by thress due to the strikes.
I hope this sums up as to why I think Plice Wheeldor










Induction Letter Success

Asymptomatic Testing at CODA

At least 1 in 3 people infected with Coronavirus still do <u>not</u> have any symptoms. Therefore, before students can come back into school, they need to receive a negative result on a Lateral Flow Test. The Lateral Flow Test will be administered in school. Students will be tested on the day before they return to school in September.

Although the Lateral Flow Test is voluntary, it is an important strategy in reducing the spread of the coronavirus. When we welcome students back, the more students that receive a test ensures increased safety for all.

Therefore, can those parents who are giving consent for their child, please complete the Microsoft Forms survey. This survey provides us with all of the details needed for the process and gives your consent. https://forms.office.com/r/gLPCJqqbDQ

Lateral Flow Tests now only involve a self-swab of the nose, further information on lateral flow tests and what they involve can be found here: https://www.cityofderbyacademy.org/information/covid-19/

The tests produce results within 30 minutes and will protect us all from the virus spreading further. Lateral Flow Tests will help find people with a 'high viral load' early, even if the individual does not have symptoms, and support my priority of keeping our community safe. After two tests have been completed in school, we expect all students to self-test twice a week at home. Home testing kits will be providing when students return in September.

If you do not wish for your child to take part in testing, they will still be able to attend school unless they have, or develop, Covid-19 symptoms. The main symptoms of coronavirus are: -

- new continuous cough and/or
- high temperature and/or
- a loss of, or change in, normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)
- persistent headache

If your child tests positive on their Lateral Flow Test, this will mean that your child will need to Self-Isolate until a PCR test has been taken. Once the PCR test has been taken, follow the guidance of the NHS.



Symptoms of Coronavirus (COVID-19)

Know the symptoms of COVID-19, which can include the following:





Symptoms can range from mild to severe illness, and appear 2-14 days after you are exposed to the virus that causes COVID-19.

*Seek medical care immediately if someone has emergency warning signs of COVID-19.

- Trouble breathing
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
- New confusion
- Inability to wake or stay awake
- Bluish lips or face

Remove your face covering and gently blow your nose into

Throw the used tissue into the healthcare waste bin provided.

This is so that you get rid of excess mucus.






Use hand sanitiser to clean your hands.

This is so that you do not contaminate the test kit.





Check if there is a swab in a sealed pack in front of you.

Identify the soft, fabric tip of the swab.





Open the package and gently take out the swab.

This will be used for swabbing both nostrils.

Important: Do not touch your tongue, teeth, cheeks, gums, or any other surfaces with the fabric tip of the swab.

The swab is invalid if it touches these parts, and you will need to get a new swab. If this happens ask a member of staff to get assistance.

Important: The swabbing may feel uncomfortable. Do not insert the swab any deeper if you feel strong resistance or pain.

If there is blood on the swab sample, please alert a member of staff



Put the swab gently into one nostril until you feel a slight resistance (about 2.5cm up your nose).

Roll the swab firmly around the inside of the nostril slowly, making 5 complete circles and slowly remove it.



Put the same swab gently into the other nostril until you feel a slight resistance (about 2.5cm up your nose).

Roll the swab firmly around the inside of the nostril slowly, making 5 complete circles and slowly remove it.

Important: After collecting the sample place the swab directly in the prepared extraction tube. Be careful not to touch any surfaces with the swab.

Put on your face covering.

Follow the instructions from a member of staff on what to do next.

Use hand sanitiser after handing in your sample.

REMOTE LEARNING FOR SELF ISOLATING STUDENTS

If your child is self-isolating but is well enough to complete school work then they need to access relevant learning.

This guide will provide you with links and information to access relevant learning so that your child does not fall behind. It is important that your child continues their learning so that they miss the minimum education. If your child does not engage in work during their self-isolation then they may be asked to participate in our 'Getting Ahead' time from 2:30-3:00pm on their return to school.

Where do I need to get my work from?

To access your remote learning you will need to login to Microsoft Teams. To access Teams you will need to go to https://portal.office.com/ and login with your school details. There is a video guide on how to do use Teams on our website:
